Dear Parents, Patrons, and Supporters of Wayne Community Schools:



As part of the application process, these students took the National Spanish Exam (NSE), which is administered annually through the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese. This year over 80,000 students from schools across the United States competed in the NSE, answering questions involving knowledge of vocab and grammar as well as listening and reading comprehension. Students Save Big at In School Bank!

Elementary students had a record year of saving at the State Nebraska Bank & Trust Blue Devil Branch. Students made nearly 2,800 deposits to save \$10,400 this year, a 32% increase from last year and a record in the bank's 5 years of operation!

Students also earned over 700 fun incentives, like bookmarks, coupons, and school supplies, provided by State Nebraska Bank & Trust. Close to 60% of the school's population has a savings account at school. On average, 95 students made deposits each week, up 22% from last year.

This month, student tellers will travel to Omaha for a year-end celebration. The trip includes a tour of the Omaha branch of the Kansas City Federal Reserve, and a presentation of certificates to the tellers, including the Stellar Teller award, given to the teller who provided the best customer service, showed up on time, promoted the Blue Devil Branch to others, and encouraged students to save. Bank CEO Matt Ley will also have lunch with the record breaking 22 students who made a deposit 100% of the bank days open.

The State Nebraska Bank & Trust Blue Devil Branch is part of a statewide effort led by the Nebraska Council on Economic Education to teach financial literacy to youth. In five years of operation, over 400 Wayne Elementary students have saved more than \$37,500 through this in-school savings program. Congrats to all these students on their great job saving!

of my job. Sometimes students have had to wait for this day for an entire year. You can imagine the smiles on their faces when I get to tell them we are going to meet their mentor. A person who is going to be there just for them to talk, play games, or just take a break with! Mentors are often more nervous than the students about their first meeting. When we sit down to make introductions, some matches hit it off easily. Others are a little quiet until we start to discuss something they have in common. Then whatever awkwardness was there quickly fades away. When I check in with the mentor after that first meeting, they almost always say something along the lines of "We had a great time! I am so glad I finally decided to this."

In recent years 92% of mentors reported leaving their mentoring time in a better mood than when they arrived. 82% of mentors say they feel more engaged at work as a result of their mentoring time. The benefit to our students is obvious, but research is showing mentors benefit just as much!

We are ending this school year with one of the longest waiting lists we have ever seen! We have 11 BOYS and 6 GIRLS waiting for a mentor ranging from 3rd-11th grade. If you have ever considered becoming a TeamMates mentor this is a great time to apply! You and your mentee will be so glad you decided to do this .
